3. **"Pottysaurus" by Brook Vitale** - Join the adorable Pottysaurus on his journey of discovery and learning of potty training. With vibrant illustrations and a fun, engaging storyline, Pottysaurus is the perfect book to captivate young minds.
4. **"Potty" by Leslie Patricelli** - This sweet and simple board book follows a toddler's journey from diapers to the potty, highlighting the excitement and challenges of potty training in a humorous and relatable way.
5. **"P is for Potty!" by Naomi Kleinberg** - Sesame Street's Elmo tells little girls and boys ages 1 to 3 all about how to use the potty in this sturdy lift-the-flap board book with more than 30 flaps to find and open!
6. **"Even Firefighters Go to the Potty" by Wendy Wax** - In this hilarious lift-the-flap book, each person – from a firefighter on the way to answer a fire alarm to a zoo keeper on the way to feed the polar bears – stops what they are doing to go to the potty. Through several humorous antics, toddlers learn that everybody uses the potty!
